Are you ready for AP U.S. History?

NOTE WELL: Before you can take this course, each of these items must be checked, you and one of your parents must sign this, and you must return this form to me.

- Do you understand that this is a college course and that you will be expected to act like a college student? Putting your head down, doing homework for another class, using your cell phone, and other misbehaviors are not tolerated in my classroom. This class functions best when it is filled with mature, hard-working, and enthusiastic students.
- Do you realize that I do not tolerate the use of cell phones, smartwatches, and/or other electronic devices in the classroom? Research confirms that electronic devices and social media are detrimental to a person's social and emotional well-being, not to mention their academic success. Therefore, electronic devices must remain off and out of sight during class time, unless I give permission to use them.
- □ Are you aware this course requires you to complete a summer assignment? This is necessary for several reasons: 1) it serves as an introduction to the course; 2) it helps acclimate you to the rigors of the course; and 3) it makes it possible for us to complete the course in time for the AP exam in May.
- □ Are you willing to work hard for the grade you want and can you accept that you might not always get the grade you are accustomed to receiving? I view this course as a process. No one is quite ready for the AP exam yet, but I will work very hard to get you ready. I see grades as a measure of your progress and not the ultimate measure of your achievement – your AP exam score is! You must be willing to accept that this can be a struggle at times.
- □ Are you prepared to take personal responsibility for your individual academic success? Let me be clear about what this means. I will work very hard to help you improve in any way I can; I will make myself available to you before/after school, during my lunch and planning periods, and from home via email. You, however, must seek that help. I will not approach you. If you are not satisfied with your performance, you must come to see me for help. If I don't hear from you, I will assume you are content. Likewise, I expect to hear from you *before* I hear from your parents.
- Do you realize that learning in this course comes from many sources? These include but are not limited to: reading the text and assigned articles in preparation for class, taking notes as you read and in class, using course wikis and blogs online, participating in optional activities (like reading books or watching videos), asking questions in class, listening to me and other students in class, engaging in class discussions and debates, attending review sessions and seeking additional help from me in one-on-one or group sessions, using online and text-based study aids, attending optional activities and events outside of class. While no student is expected or required to do all of these things (although all students should do most), you must realize that all of this is designed to help you learn and you cannot expect to succeed if you only choose to engage in one or two.
- Do you understand that this course requires you to read and comprehend sections from the textbook several times a week and to come to class prepared for a quiz and/or discussion of that reading? As mentioned above, learning in this class comes from many sources; the textbook is a major source. I cannot teach you everything you need to know in the limited time we have together. My job is to help you understand what you have read. However, to ensure you are prepared for class, I will often quiz you on the assigned material. Failure to be prepared each day will be detrimental to your grade.
- □ **Do you realize that I cannot accept assignments submitted late?** It would not be fair to other students who managed their time more effectively to extend the time for you, nor would this prepare you for the realities of collegiate standards. Expectations and due dates for all assignments will be clearly communicated to you; therefore, I will not accept things late.

□ **Do you know that this course evaluates your participation and I consider it an integral part of your assessment?** All students are trained in school to read and write; however, most careers require you to communicate verbally as well. If I can assess a student based on his/her writing or test-taking ability, it seems only fair to evaluate his/her ability to participate in class. I have a very broad definition of participation. It is excerpted here from the course syllabus:

Participation is defined as any constructive contribution to the overall learning of the individual student or his/her classmates. This includes answering and asking questions, arguing, debating, commenting, complimenting, sharing, teaching, cooperating, and helping others. In addition to one's own contributions, an important part of participation is listening to and engaging the contributions of others. Furthermore, participation can involve attendance at review sessions, after-school bonus-point opportunities, and contributions to course websites. As a general rule, each student must participate in class each day, by asking or answering at least one question.

Participation is assessed every two weeks and constitutes 10% to 15% of the course grade. The highest scores are earned by those students who participate frequently in each class and in a variety of ways and whose comments are thoughtful and reflective, and demonstrate a sincere interest in and understanding of the subject matter or a desire to understand the subject more fully. While no student will fail solely for lack of participation, you must understand that active participation helps improve your comprehension, which in turn, benefits you on other assessments. Failure to participate significantly will prevent you from achieving the highest grades possible.

- □ **Do you know that I frequently use email to communicate with students and parents?** The first part of your summer assignment helps us establish an e-mail line of communication. You need to check your email frequently for updates and additional information.
- □ Are you aware that you are required to take the College Board AP exam in May and that this test costs between \$90 and \$95? Fortunately, my students are prepared to take this exam and have repeatedly performed exceptionally well. Therefore, the cost of the test pales in comparison to the thousands of dollars in college tuition saved by earning college credit.
- □ **Do you realize that any question or concern you or your parents have is very important to me?** Please do not hesitate to contact me with your questions and concerns. I only want to help inform you about this challenging but fun and exciting course you are about to begin.
- And lastly, do you understand that my greatest goal is to make you a better student, to educate you in this subject matter, and to prepare you well for the AP exam and college beyond?
 Whatever I can do to help you in these respects, please let me know. It will not be easy for you and, at times, you may see me as anything but a "friend." However, I hope you realize we are doing this as a team, and I am just as eager to see you succeed as you are.
